

Chemin de CLUNY: GUYENNE - GASCOGNE






DIRECTION WEST - EAST : Agen - Moissac



Stage 9 R: - Caudecoste - Saint Nicolas de la Balerme

Section length: 5,1km Allow: 1h15mn Height difference: + 22m / - 43m - Difficulty: Easy



Waymarking: Red and green



Driving distance to Caudecoste is 16.5km from Agen and 36km from Moissac.

Parking: Place de la Mairie (additional parking near the D129 close to the school)

Start point: Place de la Mairie

From the main square (Place de la Mairie) turn left into 'Rue Roger Dublin'. At the end of Rue Roger Dublin turn right along the road. After about **40m**, fork left down a grass track between vegetable gardens.

At the bottom of the track, turn right. After approximately 75m, this arrives at a main road (D114). Turn right along the road. After about 20m, cross over the road and turn left over a small stone footbridge.

Continue onto a tree-lined track, passing a lavoir (former wash-house) on your left. After about **50m**, as the track turns to the right, turn into a smaller woodland path on the left. Continue on the woodland path till you come to a chain link fence next to a house. Shortly before the chain link fence ends, turn left onto a grass track. Cross a small mound over a stream and follow the path to the right.

At the end of a fence, turn right and the immediately left near an old shed. Continue on this path with a lake on your left. After a small pump house, turn left over a small bridge crossing a ditch. Turn right, keeping a mature hedge on your right.

The grass track meets a farm track. Turn right and immediately take the left fork, which leads uphill along a grass track between trees. At the top of the hill turn left onto a road and continue for approximately **1.5km** until you come to a crossroads (just after a house on the right called **'Au Carrefour'**).

Turn left at the crossroads. The road leads slightly downhill between houses. Eventually there is a house called 'Couleau' on your left, followed by a wood-clad house on your right. Immediately after the wood-clad house, turn right onto a track. This becomes a grass track and passes through orchards. Follow it round to the left. At the end of the orchards, follow a mature hedge next to a stream. Keep going until you come out on a road (D284). Turn left and follow the road into the village of St. Nicolas de la Balerme.

St Nicolas de la Balerme:

The 15thcentury **chateau of St. Phillipe** is a fine example of a Gascony style castle. It occupies an exceptional site above the flood zone on the left bank of the Garonne. It can be seen from the nearby bridge over the Garonne.

The **church of Saint Nicolas de la Balerme** was destroyed during the religious wars and was reconstructed towards the end of the 16th century. It is a mixture of Romanesque and Gothic architecture. It houses a wooden statue of Saint Roch, who became the patron saint of the parish. This listed statue was carved by a local craftsman in the 15th century.

Caudecoste:

Caudecoste is the only bastide (fortified village) founded by a religious order (Cluny).

Its history dates back to ancient times. Neolithic objects have been found here. There is also a listed Bronze Age site a few hundred meters from the village.

The first inhabitants, from 1200 BC, were Ligurians. They believed the local spring – now known as 'La Fontaine de St Jean' - had healing properties. The Ligurians were driven out around 500 BC by the Iberians, who then settled here.

The archives indicate that a village was on the present site from the year 900 AD, then belonging to the Viscount of Bruilhois. In 1049, Caudecoste (which belonged formerly to the church of Saint-Martin de Layrac) became a dependency of the Cluniac abbey, the Prior of Layrac being the "Seigneur" (Lord).



The 'lavoir' provides a stopping place for walkers and hikers on the Cluny Way, which passes through Caudecoste.
